

# Alvey returns to AIA as top civilian

Dennis Alvey, a career intelligence officer, returns to Kelly Air Force Base, Texas, after a nearly four-year absence to assume duties as executive director for Air Intelligence Agency.

In his new position, Alvey will assist AIA Commander Brig. Gen.

John Baker in reviewing, evaluating and formulating policies, concepts and objectives governing the mission of the globally-dispersed agency.

"Mr. Alvey," said Baker, "has a broad range of experience in Air Force intelligence — that, coupled with his recent Washington experiences, brings a great perspective to AIA as we continue to evolve our information operations mission."

returning to Kelly and San Antonio.

"Air Intelligence Agency has a key role in the Air Force's information superiority core competency and the scope of its operations has significantly increased since I departed more than three years ago. I look forward to assisting General Baker in the evolving information operations mission and once again working with the outstanding men and women of AIA," he said.

A member of the Senior Intelligence Executive Service, Alvey earned a bachelor of science degree in accounting and economics from the University of Evansville, Ind., in 1962, and a master of arts degree in human relations and organization and management from Pepperdine University, Calif., in 1977. He graduated from the Federal Executive Institute, Charlottesville, Va., and in 1997, attended Seminar XXI of the Foreign

Political and International Relations at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

In August 1998, he attended Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government program for senior executives in national and international security. He is also a graduate of the Air Force's Squadron Officer School, Air Command and Staff College and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces.

He served 20 years in the Air Force, retiring as a lieutenant colonel in 1982 and the following year entered government service as the deputy chief, program formulation, at AIA's predecessor, the Electronic Security Command, here.

He remained at Kelly in a variety of positions until 1995, when he moved to the Pentagon as director of resource management in the office of the assistant chief of staff for intelligence.

Alvey succeeds Dennis Richburg, who retired in October. ■
